PUBLIC HEALTH & STATE-LEVEL ADVOCACY

Contrary to common belief among public health workers in Oklahoma, the First Amendment right to free speech protects your right to express your opinions about, support, and oppose legislation. Public health workers can do more than educate to inform policymaking and legislation.

Education vs Advocacy & Lobbying



Education - Providing <u>nonpartisan</u> information and resources <u>without</u> imparting support or opposition.



Advocacy - Active support or opposition to a <u>general</u> cause or idea.



Lobbying - Communication with a <u>legislator</u> that attempts to <u>influence</u> and/or ask for support or opposition on <u>specific</u> legislation.

Limitations for OK State Employees

- Federal and state laws have limited ability to restrict your free speech rights by regulating the <u>content</u> of your speech, but may regulate the <u>context</u> of your speech - the when, where, and how you advocate.
- It is best to avoid engaging in advocacy or lobbying 1) during work hours,
 2) on or using work property, or 3) while in workwear (uniforms, work IDs, insignias, etc).

Guidance for OK State Employees

Public health workers **may advocate** and **lobby** 1) **outside of the work-place**, 2) **outside of work hours and capacity**, 3) using **personal property**, and 4) in **non-work attire**.
